Sri Chinmoy's Lincoln Center Peace Concert

Over the past 18 months, Sri Chinmoy has given over 40 Peace Concerts around the world in an effort to lay the inner foundation for a broad, new peace momentum. On October 28, 1985, he will bring his acclaimed Peace Concert series to Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts in New York. This special concert—featuring original compositions on esraj, flute, cello, harmonium and other instruments—is being held in conjunction with the 40th anniversary of the founding of the United Nations.

Sri Chinmoy's music is known for the serene, meditative atmosphere it creates, uplifting the spirit and focusing the mind on higher feelings. The haunting, lyrical quality of his compositions, and the profound stillness with which he imbues them while performing, offer a unique musical and spiritual experience.

The Peace Concerts are an outgrowth of the work Sri Chinmoy has been carrying out at the United Nations for the past 15 years. His twice-weekly meditations at the United Nations as well as the numerous seminars and peace programmes he has sponsored there have created a deeper

awareness of the spiritual dimension of the quest for world peace.

"If we say that the United Nations is a result of the 2Oth century awakening, then we are mistaken," Sri Chinmoy declared at one of his Dag Hammarskjold lectures. "The United Nations is the outgrowth of the inner awakening of human beings from time immemorial." The significance of the United Nations, he believes, far transcends its temporary successes and failures in the geopolitical world. "The outer message of the United Nations is peace. The inner message of the United Nations is love. The inmost message of the United Nations is oneness."

Sri Chinmoy's Lincoln Center Peace Concert, offered free of charge, will bring together people who care deeply about peace, including United Nations officials, leaders from many countries and distinguished individuals from all walks of life. The concert will be a reaffirmation of faith in the future of mankind, a cry for peace that will echo and re-echo in the hearts of peace-lovers and peace-servers throughout the world.





Who is going to bring about the radical change? It will be you: you and your brothers and sisters It will be you and your oneness heart, which is spread throughout the length and breadth of the world."
