U.N. trio swimming for peace

JACKSONVILLE BEACH — Three United Nations employees endured the chilly Atlantic yesterday in one of a series of swims for peace, the U.S. portion of which began this weekend.

Under an overcast sky, the three swimmers stood for a moment with their palms together in silent prayer, then headed out about noon for a 32-minute swim as a few people, wrapped snugly in their jackets, watched from the shore.

Near the surf at the foot of Beach Boulevard, a blue and white banner proclaimed the United Nations' "International Year of Peace."

To draw attention to 1986 as the U.N. International Year of Peace, Adhiratha Keefe, 38, Sunil Davidson, 38, and Shradha Howard, 32, swam about a mile. They swam later at Daytona and had swum at Savannah and Fernandina Beach on Saturday.

"I don't know how they can do it," said Alberta G. Jackson, vice president of the local chapter of the U.N. Association of the U.S.A., who was there to lend moral support.

The men began their personal swims on New Year's Day in Japan with a 2-kilometer swim around Miyajima Island near Hiroshima and

also swam in Nagasaki Harbor.

"Unless people do something more," Keefe said, the U.N.'s message for 1986 will not mean as much. "We hope that our swims can inspire others to attempt something exceptional for peace."

The threesome is also in training to swim the English Channel later this year. In September they will join about 20 other swimmers from the United States and Europe who will be attempting the channel swim to give

additional impetus to the U.N. year of peace.

In fact, the four Southeastern cities were selected because the water temperatures are similar to that of the channel, about 50 degrees, said Dhruva Hein, who travels with the group.

For Keefe, who swam the channel last year to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the U.N.'s founding, it will be a second venture.

The group funds its swims from their salaries, Hein said.

Although the men grew up in either the Jewish or Christian tradition, they all are members of a peace meditation group that meets at the United Nations under the spiritual leadership of Sri Chinmoy. And each has changed his first name and adopted a name from Sanskrit as a reminder to "go beyond what we are the present time in our prayer and outward daily lives," Hein said.

WHEREAS, we as Floridians, as Americans, and as world citizens wish to promote and spread the awareness of the necessity for deeply founded and lasting peace among humankind,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Robert W. O'Neill, Mayor of Jacksonville Beach, Florida, do hereby designate and proclaim February 10, 1986 as:

THE DAY OF THE PEACE SWIM

in the City of Jacksonville Beach, and urge all citizens to recognize this event and participate fittingly in its observance.

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
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
