Peace Concerts

One of the most striking forms of peace expansion which Sri Chinmoy has pioneered is that of his Peace Concerts. These well-attended events, launched with a concert in March 1984 before an audience of 8,000 in Cologne, Federal Republic of Germany, have captured the imagination of people of all social and economic strata and joined them in a common desire for peace.

At these Peace Concerts, performing music that he himself has composed to create an atmosphere of tranquility, Sri Chinmoy plays a variety of instruments, including Indian esraj, flute, cello, harmonium, piano and organ. The audience shares in the quiet beauty of the music as well as in moments of silent meditation for peace led by Sri Chinmoy between instrumental performances. The response to the over 100 concerts—attended by tens of thousands in dozens of cities on six continents—indicates that Sri Chinmoy has developed a unique vehicle to encourage and manifest the deep yearning for peace in the hearts of peoples the world over.

Offered free of charge, Sri Chinmoy's concerts have filled such distinguished concert halls as the Royal Albert Hall, in London, the Palais des Congrès de Montréal and Avery Fisher Hall at Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts in New York. In October 1984, over 13,000 attended two concerts held back-to-back in Paris. Of special significance was a Peace Concert held in

Los Angeles during the 1984 Olympics, with an international audience of several thousand. Another U.S. concert drew 7,000 to Minneapolis in 1987.

In December 1985, 14 Permanent Representatives to the United Nations and the Office of the Assistant Secretary-General for the 40th Anniversary of the United Nations co-sponsored a well-received Peace Concert in the General Assembly Hall Lobby, marking the culmination of the fortieth anniversary ceremonies and welcoming the forthcoming International Year of Peace.

To mark the Year of Peace, Sri Chinmoy gave a series of concerts, each including a brief talk on peace, at 20 distinguished universities worldwide. In September 1986 he gave another concert in the General Assembly Hall Lobby to mark the opening of the 4lst session of the General Assembly.

In 1987 Sri Chinmoy premiered his improvisational music on the piano and organ, in such well-known halls as Royal Albert Hall in London and Carnegie Hall and the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York.

The voluminous comments offered by listeners testify to the tangible power of the peace which Sri Chinmoy invokes during these concerts and the abiding inspiration he offers them to do something in their own lives to make the world a better place.
